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## Monthly Meeting: Repotting

The next meeting of the Houston Bonsai Society (HBS) will be Wednesday, January 6, at 7:30 p.m. at the Houston Garden Center in Hermann Park, 1500 Hermann Drive. Refreshments and Curbside Consultation at 7:00.

The January program will be repotting evergreen or deciduous trees. Soil will be available. **NO TROPICALS!!!**

January 22 **Roy Nagatoshi** will give a lecture-demo at 7 p.m. in the Houston Garden Center. On January 23, he will give workshops also in the garden center. Morning workshops will be on grafting junipers.

At the February meeting, local **pottery artist Andrew Sankowski** will demonstrate "throwing pots" with his potters' wheel. He will bring samples of his work.

In March we will have a **workshop on boxwoods**. We will have 10-15 trees available, cost will be \$20-25, and we will provide the soil. Some are Kingsville, some Saunders, some Morris midget. Bring your own pot.

## January 9, Saturday Study Group

The HBS Study Group will get together on Saturday, January 9, at Cabrera Farm Nursery located at 3910 Cabrera Dr. in Sugar Land. We'll get started at 9 a.m. and work until noon or beyond. This is a good time to do repotting of cork bark pines, black pines, red pines, quince and azaleas. If December was a cold month, it isn't too late to repot junipers. There are different approaches used when repotting based upon the type of tree, age, vigor, etc. When it comes to repotting, there is not one method that fits

all. Repotting methods will be covered and concerns addressed for the trees brought to the get-together. So bring your tree(s), soil, soil additives, root stimulator, root hooks, wire, pot, screen and bonsai tools. We are going to get dirty!!!

If you need bonsai supplies, Cabrera Farm has it for sale; the phone number is 281-313-2000. All are welcome the novice and advance bonsaist. So come and enjoy and share with others the art of bonsai.

## Monthly Bonsai Care

*John Miller, who writes a monthly column for the Bonsai Society of Dallas and the Fort Worth Bonsai Society, has agreed to share his column with us. We need to make adjustments for our warmer, damper climate, with its early springs, long summers, late falls and erratic winters.*

Christmas has gone so now you can devote your full time to bonsai again-- well, if you are not working, are not married, are a complete loner, etc. Anyhow you cannot just ignore them since they are dormant. Their needs must be met although most needs are not as strict as in the summertime.

My most unforgettable January calamity in recent years was having two Catlin elms and a trident cut and stripped by a packrat for his nest. The two elms took some time but they recovered. The trident never did. I now keep outdoor rat poison blocks scattered among the trees. I like blocks rather than pellets since they are easier to pick up come spring.

Other outdoor pest problems will depend upon the temperature. If there are many warm days, spider mites, scale, and aphids may show up. Use the same controls you did last summer. Too much water could cause root rot, fungus or other damage.

Indoor plants will have the same pest you had last summer and maybe some more since any eggs will hatch and they usually love the warm indoors. So keep your eyes peeled when you are watering.

Watering tends to be a bonsai growers biggest problem in winter. It is difficult to determine how dry the soil is when they are put close together in winter storage. That could be another argument for having a porous well-draining bonsai soil which is very difficult to over water. Just remember, the water will evaporate quickly when the warm winter sun hits the pots, and more so if there is a little breeze.

January is an excellent time to do styling work. Deciduous trees are bare so you see the real tree and are not confused and misled by foliage. Examine the branch structure and decide if you need to reposition any branches. If a tree has been styled for some time, you may need to reduce the length of some branches by selectively cutting back a larger secondary branch and developing a smaller branch. This also gives movement in the branch. Remove vertically growing twigs and branchlets. Do you need to develop more ramification? If so, make a note to go on a rigorous tip pruning when growth starts next spring.

Evergreens may be worked on although the best time would have been last fall. Their sap flow is now at a minimum so they will not bleed too much.

Do not do too much work on spring flowering plants like azaleas. Their buds were set late last summer or fall and you will be losing some blooms. Most later bloomers (wisteria and crape myrtle) generally have their blooms on new growth so you can style them now.

Greenhouses can be a great source of bonsai enjoyment in January. Of course, there are always the tropicals that stay green the year around and will therefore need a bunch of care. I let my small elms and maples get a month of cold, hopefully they get to 25 a couple of times to be really dormant. Then between Christmas and New Years, I bring them into the greenhouse and can do their repotting in January and enjoy the flush of new foliage before the bigger trees are needing anything.

The cheapest way to upgrade your collection is to join the club digs. Most digs are scheduled in the late winter which gets them at close to optimum digging stage. If you have doubts about the care after you get home, just ask any of your fellow diggers. They all like to share techniques. Collected trees are faster than other ways to get a developed bonsai. You can grow your own from cuttings. Cuttings do not take any care at all the first year, just put them under the bench and hit them with water when you do the bonsai on top.

The only way to learn bonsai is to do it. You cannot get the why out of a book. You need to have someone help you with the styling and to point out not only what he is doing but why she is doing it. All clubs work hard on having good programs but the real learning is by taking advantage of any workshops offered, both by local club personnel and by visiting artists that the club brings in. The LSBF state convention each year offers a concentrated weekend of study. I still like to watch a master work and listen to his comments. There will always be something slightly new or different or an approach that will be made clearer. Wiring or repotting in itself might be boring but the presentation is never boring.

#### **Creating Flat Root Base Shohin Bonsai Workshop, February 20**

Saturday, February 20, The Shohin Society of Texas will have a workshop called, "Creating Flat Root Base Shohin Bonsai." This workshop is all about creating shohin bonsai with flat root systems. Olive, oak, trident maple, wisteria, bougainvillea and redwood have been found to respond to the advanced techniques used to create a flat root system. It is probable that ficus and possibly yaupon holly will

also respond to the techniques. Start looking now for 1 gallon to 5 gallon listed trees.

The workshop will follow the procedure developed by Doug Philips. To prepare, visit Doug's website at <http://www.dugzbonsai.com/index.htm> (click on "Olive Tour"). Also read his detailed article, "Flat Cut Olive Trees," in the winter 2002 edition of *Bonsai: The Journal of the American Bonsai Society*. If you do not have the magazine, check your home club's library. Both the website and article give great show-and-tell details. This will be an exciting workshop.

## Committee Reports

Following are reports of various committees of the HBS for 2009 – 2010:

### LSBF/HBS Convention, 2009

The convention was a rainy success, but it was a good one. The opening day, Friday was a good day and many people visited the convention. Saturday was a very rainy day and very few people braved the rain. On Sunday, the sun came out! All is good that ends well. The combined efforts of the Houston Bonsai Society members working in seven committees made the convention a success. I want to thank the committee chairpersons who spent many hours meeting and planning the things that made the convention a success. Many thanks for a job well done to JoAnn and David, Pete, Hurley, John, Donald, Alan and to all of the others who helped. The raffles, exhibit vendors, goodie buckets, good food, excellent bonsai artists, and good workshop materials all contributed to the convention success.

The convention did not make a large amount of money, but we did not lose any either. Houston Bonsai Society and LSBF each received \$1524.45 for their part of the convention income. LSBF gave HBS \$500 seed money as it does to every club to help with initial planning.

The Lone Star Bonsai Federation or LSBF was formed in 1980. The purpose was to bring together the bonsai clubs in Texas and to help with the state conventions. The federation originally consisted of twelve clubs throughout Texas—Austin, Dallas, Corpus Christy, Fort Worth, Houston, Longview, San Antonio, The Shohin Society of Texas (in Austin), Tyler, Abilene, Beaumont and McAllen. The clubs at Tyler, Abilene, Beaumont and McAllen are no longer active.

The federation is served by a president, first vice president, secretary and treasurer. Each active club is represented by a delegate and alternate. The federation meets three times a year in Austin and publishes the *Texas Bonsai* newsletter three times a year. The newsletter is distributed to most members via Internet and hard copies are made available to members without Internet access. Every member of active clubs is a member of the federation, and my goal is to assure every member receives the LSBF *Texas Bonsai* newsletter.

The minutes of the LSBF meetings are finalized within three weeks of the meeting and sent to the newsletter editor to be included in the *The Bonsai News of Houston*.

The federation sponsors a speaker once a year who travels to the member clubs. We call this event the Texas Tour Artist. The federation pays the airline expenses for the artist. Each club schedules the number of events (lecture/demonstrations and/or workshops) for their club and pays the artist's event fees.

### The Bonsai News of Houston

The HBS publishes *The Bonsai News of Houston* monthly on the Thursday before the monthly meeting. The deadline for the newsletter is 8:00 p.m. the Wednesday two weeks before the monthly meeting. Contributions from our members are welcome, whether the contribution be a news item; a hint for success; a warning about something that does not work; or a tip for finding good buys on plants, fertilizers, soil amendments and such. Longer articles on some aspect of bonsai growing or styling are particularly welcome.

The HBS is indebted to Gary Teeter, HBS webmaster, who handles the distribution of the emailed newsletters. Almost from the beginning of electronic newsletters, anti-spam filters have been a problem. They remain a problem today. Gary has circumvented the problem by posting the newsletter directly on the HBS web site and sending an electronic notice to members and other recipients. The current newsletter is "hidden" from the general public.

The HBS exchanges newsletters with the seven other LSBF clubs. From time to time we also exchange newsletters with other bonsai clubs. We distribute approximately one hundred newsletters by email and about twenty by U. S. post.

Since about 2004, the HBS has posted the non-current newsletters on the web site for the general public. At the time we began posting the newsletters, we also posted back newsletters starting with the year 2000. At that time, no one thought to remove our members' private information. To correct the oversight, I have begun a process of going back and removing that information for the newsletters that have already been posted. The update would not be possible without the support of Gary Teeter. Now, we have two editions of the newsletter, the "member edition"

(complete with contact information where necessary) and the "Internet edition" (edited to remove personal information). Each month, when I send Gary the current newsletter for posting, I remove personal information from the prior month's newsletter before it is posted for the public. I expect to finish the updating process of the back issues by May or June, 2010.

Again, I would encourage you to submit articles, tips, hints, warnings to the newsletter. Your input is what makes a newsletter "the Houston newsletter."

This is an opportunity to bring in your tools, wire and trees in all stages of development to get assistance. When the meeting is held at a bonsai nursery there are additional advantages. Attending the Saturday Study Group at a nursery allows for advice and the purchasing of bonsai trees and supplies.

**Planned Changes to the program for 2010.** Due to scheduling conflicts in 2009 four of the Saturday get-togethers had to be canceled. To reduce scheduling conflicts and allow for more meeting we will be changing the meeting dates and adding locations. In 2010 most meetings will be the **first Saturday after the regular monthly** meeting. We will be meeting at Cabrera Farm Nursery in Sugar Land, Timeless Trees in Rosenberg, Mercer Arboretum in Humble and Bayland Park in Southwest Houston. We are expanding the meeting locations with emphasis on getting together at bonsai nurseries. Additionally we will be showing instructional or informational video at the various locations.
